Mentoring is conducted at an Official Show and should cover a range of horse and rider classes to adequately demonstrate understanding of all aspects on the record sheet.

Mentoring is a cooperative arrangement between the Mentor and the Candidate. It occurs in an informal environment where discussion and analysis of horses, riders and workouts should occur freely. The State Show Horse Committee may wish to see the extent of the mentoring that occurred.

Once the Mentor considers a candidate has sufficient understanding of all skills listed on the record sheet, they are required to verify this and circle 'Competent' in the space provided within the comment box.

Show Horse Candidate Judge - Practical Assessment Record

Practical Assessment is conducted at an Official Show with a National or State Level Judge and should cover a range of horse and rider classes to adequately demonstrate understanding of all aspects on the record sheet. Assessors and Candidates are subject to all conflict of interest rules contained in the EA Show Horse Rules. Assessors shall be appointed/approved by the State Show Horse Committee.

This assessment activity may only be conducted after the Mentoring activity has been completed.

This assessment activity is aimed at assessing candidates' comprehension of Show Horse judging knowledge and practical skills in a judging environment. It is assumed that the candidate will have acquired all necessary knowledge to perform all competencies during the assessment.

The Assessing Judge shall observe the candidate and indicate C (competent) or NYC (not yet competent) for each area of competency. 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Notes for Candidates and Assessors

Competence means that the Candidate can perform (demonstrate) a task to the standard required consistently and that they can also demonstrate an understanding of the theory (i.e. the technical or underpinning knowledge) which is relevant to the task. It is also important that the candidate is able to demonstrate their ability to cope with the task in a variety of circumstances i.e. the candidate can adjust their delivery if the circumstances require.

The Assessors can and should always discuss the performance of a task with a Candidate and find out why they did the task in a particular way before making their final decision. The Assessors may use this discussion as an additional opportunity to gain evidence regarding the candidate's competence.

Results

It is preferred that candidates receive their results at the completion of the assessment. Assessors are required to outline candidate deficiency and/or areas of success when providing feedback. The Assessor may offer advice regarding the future learning for the Candidate.

Supplementary Assessment

Where a candidate has not reached a satisfactory standard in one or more of the competencies they may represent at a later date for re-assessment of that competency (or competencies).

Prior to Assessment

Candidates should;

Introduce themselves to the Assessor Present a copy of the judging program Discuss with the Assessor where they will be positioned throughout the assessment Ask questions of the Assessor, if required, then proceed with judging

During the Assessment

During the Show candidates should;

Present the workouts in a manner to allow Assessor to see and hear all aspects

Ensure that all activities are conducted safely

Demonstrate good group control and the correct calling of commands at all times

Provide workouts to suit the skill level of horses or riders

At the end of judging the candidate will give feedback (if requested) in a manner to allow the Assessor to see and hear all aspects

After the Assessment

Candidates should;

After concluding judging, present to the Assessor. The candidate should briefly summarise the classes judged with consideration to;

- Summary of ability and quality of horses and riders
- Reasons behind the workouts given
- Time management

The post assessment debrief is an opportunity for the Candidate and the Assessor to interact and to clarify any outstanding concepts and rationales. This process can be considered as an interview where candidate can provide additional information and/or the Assessors source additional evidence about candidate's knowledge

Notes for Assessors

Apart from assessing the candidate, Assessors should evaluate the skill and quality of the classes judged and if the assessor and candidate interpretation differ, then it is important that the assessor listens to the reasons why the candidate ranked the classes as they did.

Consider time management and the candidates skills to keep the lesson progressing

Provide candidates with accurate and constructive feedback.

Note on the Assessment Record or on additional paper the reasons supporting your assessments, in the event that you are required to justify your assessment.

EA Show Horse Judge Open Rule Book Test

This test may be completed at any time without supervision. Completion of this test with 80% pass rate is a requirement for candidates wishing to:

- o become a Provisional Judge (see 6.2.1) or to upgrade to State or National Level (see 6.2.2; 6.2.3)
- o apply for recognition of current competency (see 6.2.5)
- o return to the judges list after accreditation has lapsed (see 6.3.2)

The answers for this test will be found in the EA Show Horse Rules, the EA Medication Control Policy, the EA Member Protection Policy, the EA Code of Conduct for Officials and the EA Disciplinary By-Laws. These documents are all available on the EA National Web Site www.equestrian.org.au Candidates are recommended to be familiar with these documents.
